#### This week at St Martins

This week in **EYFS**, our children have been focusing on the difference between capital and lowercase letters, practising correct letter formation, and writing their names. Our Math's objective has been patterns, and the children had lots of fun creating patterned snakes to celebrate Chinese New Year! As part of our Understanding the World learning, we explored the food pyramid and discussed what it means for us to enjoy a balanced diet. In our Personal and Social lesson, we were lucky to have Aariyan's mum come and visit us! As a dentist, she taught us about the food we eat and why looking after our teeth is so important. A huge thank you to her for sharing her knowledge and helping us understand the importance of oral hygiene!

This week, **Form 1** set off on an exciting adventure to the Natural History Museum, eager to uncover the secrets of the prehistoric world! The highlight of the visit was a fascinating workshop all about Stegosauruses, where students learned about these incredible, spiky-tailed herbivores. They even had the chance to take part in interactive activities that brought the world of dinosaurs to life. After the workshop, the students explored the museum's incredible dinosaur exhibit, coming face to face with towering skeletons, lifelike models, and even the famous roaring Tyrannosaurus Rex! Their enthusiasm was contagious as they asked thoughtful questions, marveled at the ancient fossils, and deepened their understanding of these prehistoric creatures. In addition to their scientific discoveries, Form 1 demonstrated fantastic independence and teamwork by navigating London's tubes and trains with confidence. They worked together to follow directions and travel safely - an achievement just as impressive as their newfound dinosaur knowledge! A huge well done to all the students for their curiosity, enthusiasm, and excellent behaviour throughout the trip. It was a truly memorable day of learning, adventure, and discovery!

**Form 2** have had a very busy week. They wrote manuals about how to defeat a witch using some advanced techniques to add weight to their points. They have been exploring volume and capacity, comparing, ordering and measuring containers as well as reading scales marked in millimetres. In Science they learnt about classifying materials and writing notes about an experiment as well as using team work to show others how to create an electrical circuit. They have used their knowledge of parts of the body in French to help tell the story of the big bad wolf. The high point of the week however has been the trip to the Tower of London where they have seen some of the crown jewels, explored the white tower and had a go at some traditional skills such as archery and jousting by using the virtual interactive games. They were also taught how to become a knight by Princess Joan daughter of King Edward I.





#### This week at St Martins (continued)

This week, **Form 3** wrote diaries describing a day in the life of Odysseus or another character, based upon our class reader. In Maths, we are looking at angles, lines and shapes, getting to grips with terms like acute, obtuse, reflex and right angle. In RE they drew pictures to represent the Chrisian concept of the Trinity and in Science they classified materials into transparent, translucent and opaque. During Topic lessons, they enjoyed researching Ancient Greek gods and goddesses and in IT they learned to design magazine covers using templates to help set out their information. Finally, in Art they finished their Greek vases and began to paint them.

**Form 4** have been planning and writing their own fantasy narratives based on the Demon Dentist. We included elements of suspense and description. We also worked on finding areas and perimeters of simple shapes and compound shapes. In DT, we applied our knowledge of circuits to create circuit boards for a demon drill! We look forward to building the casings next week. We also investigated how plaque and acid can cause cavities in teeth and have set up an experiment to see how vinegar and sweet drinks might affect the enamel on our teeth. We played tag rugby and football in Games and taken one last look at the reign of Elizabeth I in Topic. We have also researched more reasons why Elizabeth I might be seen as a good or a bad monarch. In IT, we have again applied our knowledge of coding to create patterns, using repeated codes.

In English lessons, **Form 5** have written their news reports which took the form of newspaper articles, websites and live news reports. In preparation of planning and writing their own penny dreadful stories, they have analysed some of the language in Cogheart which the author used to describe the setting. They used this to write their own gothic setting descriptions and focused particularly on personifying the weather. In Topic, Form 5 looked at further sources and retrieved information from these to learn how the rich and poor differed in their living conditions during the Industrial Revolution. In Computing, the children learned how to use selection in their programming in which a button can be used to turn on a light source. In their Science lesson, the children investigated pendulums; they chose their own input variable to test such as how mass affects a pendulum's oscillation. Our brilliant Form 5 students have been diving deeper into the world of fractions, exploring a variety of problem-solving strategies. They've been putting their skills to the test by comparing different methods and discussing which ones are the most efficient. It's fantastic to see their enthusiasm and teamwork as they challenge themselves and each other!

**Form 6's** English lessons this week were particularly enjoyable as they rehearsed their lines for the whole school show, whilst working on both stage presence and positioning. In Latin, the children have learnt how to recognise and translate masculine nouns in both the singular and the plural.

In art, Form 6 have been unleashing their creativity behind the lens, experimenting with photography through the theme "Close, Closer, Closest." They've been discovering how perspective and detail can completely transform an image, capturing fascinating shots that showcase their artistic eye. During maths lessons, the children have sharpened their skills by identifying linear and non-linear sequences and taking their learning to the next level by plotting the nth term on a graph. They've been uncovering patterns, making predictions, and bringing numbers to life in a whole new way. Form 6 have been putting their coding skills to the test by creating their very own animations! Using creativity and logic, they've been programming moving graphics, bringing their ideas to life on screen.

PE has been hugely exciting this week as we extend a huge congratulations to our students who have successfully completed their swimming course and earned their well-deserved life-saving skills certificate! 🔊 🕉 Their dedication and hard work has equipped them with vital water safety knowledge and rescue techniques.

The ISCB's (Independent Schools Council Board) legal action over the introduction of VAT on independent school fees has been fast tracked – the legal challenge will take place in the High Court between 1st and 3rd April. The defendant to the claim is the chancellor, Rachel Reeves, as the minister responsible for the Treasury. Lord Pannick KC, who is leading the case, will argue that the introduction of VAT impedes access to education at independent schools and is incompatible with the right to education guaranteed by Article 2 of the First Protocol of the European Convention on Human Rights.

I will continue to follow this case closely and update as I am unable.
